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From the Chair

A question for those of you who like quizzes; when was the last time (or the first!) a British Prime Minister mentioned Orienteering in a public statement? If you know the answer, you were probably listening to Radio 5 Live on Friday 13th July, when, in an interview, Gordon Brown quoted Orienteering as one of the 'wider range' of sports currently being offered to school children.

In general, some sports (if not most) get very little publicity in the media as a whole. This does not necessarily prevent them from being popular, as fishing would testify. Others, like sailing, get publicity once every four years when they boost our Olympic medal table standings, thus compensating for the lack of success in higher profile sports. I'm not convinced that a short term 'blaze' of publicity has any lasting effect on any sport – remember the bronze medal winning men's hockey team all those years ago in Seoul, 1988 – or perhaps you don't.

So what was the significance for Orienteering of Gordon Brown's interview? It is highly unlikely that we will be inundated with youngsters wanting to take part in future events. What it does signal is that the efforts being made around the country to encourage youngsters to take part in the sport through schools, has been recognised at the highest level of Government. So the work of Mike & Dorothy Smith and Mike Cope in providing schools with the maps essential for a high quality Orienteering experience and their coaching support, in conjunction with our Regional Development Coordinator, Colin Best, is not going unnoticed. However, as we are acutely aware, 'taking horses to water does not necessarily make them drink' and there is much to be done to get young people actively involved in orienteering at Club and District level.

This is not just an issue for our club, YHOA is devoting its first Development Conference to the subject on 22^{nd} September. (See page 8 - ed.) Representatives from all the clubs in our region will devote the day to tackling the question of how to get young people into our sport and keeping them there. We will be there and will, I anticipate, learn from current practice in our region and the country as a whole. Without juniors, orienteering has a very limited future. Our junior membership is pitifully small and getting older!!

The problem is a simple one but the solution is considerably more complex and is unlikely to reside solely in schools. Your thoughts, suggestions and help will always be welcome and appreciated.

However, it is not all doom and gloom, read on(see next page)





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White Rose weekend

Let's do (the Timewarp) again

By the terrain description you would think Pickering Forest, featuring the plateau of Stoney Moor, was going to be a treat, ooops, first mistake. We (myself, Amanda and Charlotte) decided fairly early that we would only be doing the 2 Regional Events on Saturday and Sunday (over the August Bank Holiday weekend) as we would be travelling each day.

Saturday - too long and not nice! The flat, bilberry infested plateau of Stoney Moor, was "vague". If there isn't much contour detail then it's always going to be a bit of a lottery if you can't even hit a control from an attack point within a couple of hundred metres of the flag. The semi-open nature of the terrain did not help, and to try to convey vegetation as such was perhaps a mistake on the mapper's part. After the initial flailing around on the moor we then proceeded to battle against the slopes of the surrounding woodland which flanked the moor on 3 sides.

Just when you thought it was safe - i.e. finish in sight, a number of courses were cruelly sent back into the woodland with even steeper slopes, to complete an extra loop to finish. One control at the end was only reachable by pulling yourself up the slope on any available tree as you tried to avoid slipping back down to the previous control due to the steepness and consistency (wet + mud) of the slope.

What a grand time we had (not!)

With this in mind, Sunday could only get better, and, fortunately, it did! Although we started straight into the the steep slopes, they were generally more runnable and so more pleasant to attempt to navigate through. We hit the moor at the finish of the courses this time and so, remembering lessons from Saturday, careful navigation was the order of the day.

There was also a Night Score (Saturday), traditional Relay (Monday a.m.) and Bike-O (Monday p.m.). The weather was very, very good, which helped. Somehow it felt like going back in time, when the White Rose was a lottery - early starters battering through the forest and late starters benefiting from the elephant tracks, but then again, what else can you expect from North Yorkshire in August!

No White Rose next year - but a National Event in May followed by a Chasing Start Regional Event the day after (or so I believe) - so you too can savour the experience of grotty North Yorkshire forests at their best - well they won't be any better as the undergrowth should be at it's lowest! Look out M45 Short, here I come again............. some people never learn!!!

b.t.w. Charlotte finished 3rd overall (JW5s) and had her "official" welcome to the YHOA Junior Squad - training starts in September, Brian finish 1st overall (M45s), and Amanda (W40s) would rather not talk about it, at least not until next year when she moves up into W45!

The Scottish Six Days

A tremendous weeks' Orienteering. The Scottish Six days is noted for the extremely technical courses combined with tough going underfoot. Quite a challenge, and this year was no exception.

Day 1 Alvie: The week started with a vengeance. The greatest climb of the week was coupled with typical Scottish terrain. Steep hillsides with heather moorland on the top. Lots of squiggly contours and a good scattering of boulders & crags in the forest. The car park provided the spectators with views of the competitors trying to navigate across complex rock features on the open slope down to the finish.

Day 2: Balavil: Essentially two hills with a river in a deep gorge in between. The river required a lot of care when crossing. One feature of the week was the use of waterproof maps which did not need bags. These proved very effective when John Chaney lost his footing and his map was swept downstream. He retrieved it 15m downstream when if came lodged underwater in some rocks. Still in perfectly good condition. (the map that is, not necessarily JC). Although the hill tops were open, the courses mainly stuck to the lower slopes where traversing the complex contours in limited visibility made the navigation particularly challenging. Especially as the dense network of old tracks, narrow rides and extraction lanes were not mapped.

Day 3: Inshriach West: A name that has become synonymous with technical difficulty from previous years. The start for the longer courses was in an area of light green so low visibility meant that care had to be taken. This was particularly the case as mapped rides and unmapped extraction lanes could be easily misinterpreted. Once out of this area, the forest was much more open, and as in previous days navigation by contours rather than rides was the technique to use.

Day 4: Culbin: A totally different area and experience to the other days. The wooded sand dunes of the Moray Firth. The forest is essentially flat with a ridge of complex sand dunes running along the shore line. Behind these hillocks and mounds with complex contours rise from the flat forest floor. Although there is a path network, relocation could be difficult as one area looks very much like another, with no big features to home in on.

Day 5: Camerory: A pair of wooded hills in an area of moorland, Contouring around the hillsides meant a lot of care was needed with the now familiar difficulty of deciding which patch of open / crag / boulder was which and if it was on the map. Hard going under foot through the forest for the less fit. On the moor, navigation was easier with the big features evident, The going through the heather was tough however, and those with several legs on the moor found it a bit of a slog.

Day 6 L Anagach West: A series of detailed moraine ridges finished the week off with another hard days competition. There were no big hills, but the total climb was still significant up and down the 25m high ridges. Although there was an extensive path network, the well planned courses meant the paths could not be used very much. The one disappointment was the need for a remote finish on some courses, about 1 Km from the assembly area. There was a total lack of atmosphere at this finish which was a bit of a let down on the last day.

Overall thoughts: Another excellent Scottish Six days in some of the best bits of Scotland. Although the orienteering was challenging, the planning was generally very good with quite reasonable finishing times. Days 5 & 6 were within walking distance of the campsite & Event centre. and all the other days were within reasonable travelling distance. The organisation was again impressive with only one or two minor glitches. It was great that the finish was in the assembly area each day (apart from some courses in day 6). It really led to a good atmosphere. A special mention to the ladies servicing the loos. They were there every day and all day with a pleasant smile with a mission to keep the loos clean. The best loos ever! The weather was kind most days. A little rain at the start of the week, and only one day when the car parking field looked a little desperate, so a typical Scottish week.

What about the results? Trophies collected throughout the week were few and far between. They did include however 3rd place for Mike Smith on Day 4 in M60S and for Mark Tyszka on both days 3 & 4 in M70S well done Mike & Mark.

To get some idea about relative performances the following table of positions by points may be of interest: The totals are the best of four days. Unfortunately Sue Chaney only did the four days, and one bad run knocked her score down.

An award for perseverance to Pat O'Grady for the longest time to find a control at 27.08 mins for Number 7 on Day 3. Honourable mentions for over 25 mins to Sue Chaney and particularly Mike Cope who took just over 25 minutes to find the first control on Day 6. I might just have been tempted to give up at that stage of the week, but not Mike who battled through to the finish. I was hoping to record the competition for fastest from the last control to the finish line, but Martin Kullich was fastest every day so no one else got a look in.

On the 8th August (the rest day from orienteering!) an expedition was undertaken by 5 old guys and 1 young lady. The aim was to reach the summit of Braeriach at 1296m (4252ft), the UK's third highest peak.

With the expedition party consisting of 6 members one would believe that we would only need a map and compass, but oh no. The party actually had 5 GPS, 6 mobile phones, and a pair of poles. I'm not sure a map and compass even made it out of the bag!

The weather conditions could not have been better with little cloud and plenty of sun. On the summit there was a light breeze. The party made exceptional time to the summit despite the challenge of the Chalamain Gap and the numerous stops to see which member of the party had the correct altitude on their GPS. (As well as altitude, there were regular reports of barometric pressure, temperature, latitude & longitude, and one or two other key indicators. John's combined wristwatch / compass was essential in identifying the co-ordinates of Aviemore & surrounding peaks. — Ed)

Once at the summit it was time for lunch and for Paddy to hand round half a fruit cake that he'd carried up. (Was this a strategy to slow him down?) Following lunch the party split into 3 with John and Emma Fulwood going onto the next top. Mike and Neil followed on and then to several more tops to find a view of Loch Einich. John Chaney and Paddy took a different route down and found an aeroplane wreck from 1945, which was just up John's street.

We all met up again half way down the mountain. The walk felt much longer on the way back but I'm sure after 27km and 8 and a half hours anyone would be feeling tired. The sun remained out for the rest of the day for it to be enjoyed by all.

As your Expedition leader I would personally like to thank all the members of the party for an excellent walk with good humour and breathtaking views. I look forward to next year!

Yorkshire and Humberside Orienteering Association (YHOA) Colour coded Awards

How can you show other orienteers that you have achieved a certain standard in orienteering? Well, one possible way is to apply for a 'Colour-Coded Award' when you have completed three orienteering courses at a particular standard.

A competitor qualifies for a Colour Coded Award by achieving the Colour Coded Standard for that colour course

A White Colour Coded Standard is achieved by anyone who successfully completes the White course.

The Colour Coded Standard (for courses other than White) is calculated using whichever of the following two methods gives the larger number of qualifiers:

* the time that is achieved by at least 50% of those who started the course

OR

* 150% of the winner's time.

Pairs can qualify for Colour Coded Awards on the White, Yellow and Orange courses

The Colour Coded Standard time for each course should be included in the final results.

When you have done this, you will be given (free of charge!) a YHOA fabric badge of your achieved colour, which can be sewn onto your O-top to show your improvement.

To apply for your badge you need to write to: **Dorothy Smith, 111A Westgate, Belton, Doncaster, DN9 1PY** supplying the following information:

- your full name and club (or school, if not a BOF member);
- the colour of badge being claimed;
- the date, name and venue of the three events on which the award will be based:
- a stamped self-addressed envelope.
