From the Chair

Do you feel orienteering gives value for money?

Attending a recent YHOA committee meeting (definitely the least favourite task I perform as HALO Chair) there was a discussion about the necessity to have both District and Regional type events. Not so long ago there was probably a clear distinction between them in terms of quality of courses and the level of organisation required. Electronic punching has significantly reduced the quality gap between courses and, having organised both types of event recently, the organisation aspect is more about the venue than the type of event.

So, why are the entry fees for Regional events almost double those for District events? If it is due to increased costs, what are they and do they justify the higher fee? The economies provided by new technology, as we move out of the development stage of SI, do not appear to have resulted in any lowering of entry fees, particularly for Regional events. I can only conclude that these have now become lucrative revenue raising events, particularly as they tend to attract at least as many entrants as an equivalent District event for disproportionately less organisational cost per competitor.

I recently received an (unprecedented) E-mail from the organiser of a Regional event in our region, quite concerned about the very low number of pre-entries so far received. The number of entries at our recent Regional event at Pillar was disappointing considering the reputation of the area. Perhaps other people are beginning to think about this issue and are more discerning where and when they orienteer?

Events revenue is essential for clubs to fund their development and on-going capital expenditure; there can be little argument about that. However, it should not be to swell bank balances, particularly at a time when we are trying to attract more people into the sport as well as retain those we already have.

On 16th March there is an Aire Regional Event at Skipton which at £6 appears reasonable for a that type of event but would it be as low if there were not a £5 parking fee? With District events at Whitby (CLOK) and Mansfield (NOC) on the same day, the results lists may attract more scrutiny of the competitors clubs than their run times.

The issue as to why we should continue to have two types of event was originally raised by British Orienteering and I think it requires serious consideration. The immediate response to this issue from most people focuses on the number of courses which are clearly greater for Regional events, but is it essential to have so many? Software can be written to select on the basis of age class or any other field that happens to be entered on the visit data base, so production of results should not be a problem.

I suspect this particular issue will run a little longer yet.

Thank you to those of you who helped at Pillar, to Brian for some fast and furious courses and to John for his meticulous organisation. Our next District event is at Houghton on 20th April, right at the start of the 'Poacher' season. Sue Chaney will be delighted to receive offers to help on the day.

1. Wed 16 April Hendale near Gt. Limber TA 097074

Mixed woodland, part of the Earl of Yarborough's estate. From the A1084 1.25 miles SE of Bigby turn NE signposted Searby Top. Proceed for 2 miles, initially on tarmac then on green lane. Park carefully at side of track. Exit will be along track at side of wood. Please start early as daylight is limited.

There may be a small charge for parking to defray access payment.

3. Wed 30 April Mausoleum Woods Gt Limber *TA* 134092

Mixed woodland, part of the Earl of Yarborough's estate. From the cross-roads 0.5 mls east of the New Inn on the A18, turn N. towards Brocklesby for 1km. Turn left onto estate road, bearing left after 200m. Follow directions along track.

4. Wed 7 May Nettleton Woods Caistor TF 095991

Mixed woodland with open and semi-open areas. Follow the A46 from Caistor for 2 miles towards Mkt. Rasen past Nettleton village, 400m. beyond garage at end of wood turn right (west) down track for 300m. Park carefully at Oaks Guide Camp.

Planner: Mark Tyszka Post-race analysis: Salutation Inn, Nettleton (A46)

5. Wed 14 May Swallow Vale nr. Caistor TA 174043

Mixed wooded glacial valley with adjoining open areas, part of the Earl of Yarborough's estate. From the A46 crossroads at Swallow, take the Limber road NW for 1km. Turn right towards Swallow Vale Farm for 500m.

6. Wed 21 May Primrose Warren, nr. Brigg SE 950065

Mixed woodland with sandy open areas. From Junction 4 of M180 travel north towards the A18 roundabout for 100m. only. Turn left through gated entrance into wood. Follow track for 1km.

7. Wed 28 May Willingham Woods, Mkt. Rasen. TF 131893

Mixed Forest Enterprise woodland. Follow A631 east from Market Rasen. Turn left down forest track, immediately before picnic layby. Follow track as directed.

8. Wed 4 June Halliday Hill, Great Limber TA 107068

Mixed woodland, part of the Earl of Yarborough's estate. Park at Grasby Bottom crossroads, 2 miles NE of Grasby, 2 miles SW of Great Limber.

9. Wed 11 June Brocklesby Park, nr. Humberside Airport TA 128123

Event Reports by Brian Ward

19th January - YHOA Junior Squad Training - Brayton Barff, Selby

With Charlotte now resident in the Junior Sqaud it was a great excuse for me to be able to get in some (much needed) Technique Training as well! Although small and brambly, Brayton Barff is, non the less, a great little area. It's the only hill in the Vale of York and provides super views from the hill-top. Two Juniors provided the day's courses, all enthusiastically completed by those present. From here we moved on to...

YHOA Night League Event - EBOR – Bishopwood

I've not done a Night-O since around 1980 so it was great to shadow Charlotte around the Short. Squelchy underfoot, and mostly offering route choice via "which path route shall I take?" it was brilliant! We loaned Head Torches and had a great time chasing the pair that started 2 minutes in front of us. If only I could persuade Charlotte to do more of these events – but that might be a big ask!

20th January – EBOR District Event – Bishopwood

Lesson learned from last year when I over-did it and ran Brown, when I wasn't at all up to it, this time round I plumped for Blue. You can add on 20%ish to the Course Length before you even start – so 6km on Blue realistically works out at more like just over 7km on the straight line. Bishopwood is an area where you have very few opportunities to travel the straight line, the brambles are far too ferocious for that!

Steady as she goes, very little time lost, although there are very few technical legs / controls, the light green nature of some of the wood / ditch combination can be tricky if not approached with caution – another lesson from last year!

27th January – SYO Regional Event – Tankersley, Sheffield

A super day, dry, bright and sunny, if not a little chilly initially, turned into a great "O" experience. Again, let down by my own technical incompetence, couldn't hide the fact that this is a gem of an area. Plenty of tracks and small paths, confusing in them self, coupled with a wealth of small contour detail, the legacy of the industrial history of the terrain, gave you a testing technical work out. Just a shame for me that I'm yet to discover my "O" form, I reckon it takes 3 or 4 events to get back into a proper "O" mentality, so, maybe next time? (where have I heard that before?).

10th February – NOC Regional Event – Budby, Sherwood Forest

It's easy to go to area's like this with the mentality – easy area – don't need to "Orienteer" – wrong! I think there's potential for bigger time loss on an easy area than on a difficult area as your concentration levels tend to be more relaxed. I certainly approached the event with a caution normally reserved for more technical terrain, and I think it paid off! Some delightful open and runnable woodland, mostly flat or only very gently undulating, accurate compass work coupled with checking off all those Stag Oaks, was the general order of the day. Again, weather-wise – spot on! A slightly chilly and frosty start paved the way for clear blue sky and bright sunshine – sometimes a nuisance in itself as you ran due south along tracks directly into it's bright light! We (me!) are starting to get the hang of this Orienteering again now, and with the training starting to look a bit more meaningful here's hoping for a good JK – as that's the main season's aim.

17th February – CLOK Regional Event and Northern Championships – Arncliffe Woods

Global Warming – don't you just love it! A cold and frosty start, but GLORI-OUS sunshine, just as well, as the walk to the start was 30 minutes. The area consists of two distinct features – STEEP woodland, a 50/50 mix of good and, well, not good, runnability! plus the gently sloping open moor, a 50/50 mix of bracken and heather – both mostly passable at this time of year.

We started along a path, frozen solid by the the overnight frost then headed vertically upwards through the woods onto the open moor. Visability here was excellent, it would have been an entirely different story had the mist been down or rain / sleet been present. As it was, I generally found the best course of action to run on compass, noting the vague contour shapes on route and into the control.

Some nice compass legs too down off the moor and back through the woods to the finish. Courses were planned on the short side, probably as an allowance in case of poor weather – and probably a good decision by those responsible. The woods are physically demanding, and the contrast between them, and the more easy going on the moor, gave a nice balance to the courses, the brilliant weather being a massive bonus.

Pillar Woods, HALO Regional Event, 3rd February.

I think course shape and leg length variety are the key factors I consider when planning. Pillar is a great venue for both of these priorities. You can throw in long legs, running both north-south and east-west across the map – the central open area is a real boon too, in my eyes, as you switch competitors focus from woodland to open and back again.

My main concern with Pillar is the runnability, ideally you need to look at an area 12 months in advance, in practice, having planned Harvester previously, I had a very good idea of what underfoot conditions would be like in February.

Brian (Slater) did the major re-mapping which was required, generally just tidying up what I'd made a mess of! What became obvious to me was the desperate need for; in particular, the northern half of the area to be looked at, as, with many other places, the runnability year on year just keeps getting better.

Fallen trees now abound, mixed with rootstocks, knolls which were once rootstocks and tree stumps we (HALO) ought to have another good look at the whole area next time we plan to hold an event in Pillar and try to standardise, these features in particular.

You can't realistically plan beyond technical difficulty 3 here, but the general quality of the straight line running and the sheer size and shape of the area warrants a Regional standard competition. I arm-chair planned the majority of the courses in advance of my first visit and tried to tag controls in the rain, without pre-marking the tapes, then discovered waterproof ink doesn't necessarily work if your tags are already wet!

A few tweaks after consultation with the controller and we were set, just some minor map corrections, courtesy of Mr. Slater and then down to the nitty gritty. It's surprising what becomes noticeable when you get your first complete set of pre-marked maps for all the courses, things that you don't notice on OCAD become glaringly obvious on "proper" maps. So, some more minor adjustments because I felt them necessary, and one or two from the controller – which I totally agreed with, but missed at the arm-chair stage and Brian (S) could weave his magic with producing the final maps and control descriptions, plus finalising the SI side of things. Brian does an awful lot of behind-the-scenes work, and without him I would have definitely struggled!

I had to use some very short legs on the longer courses to turn competitors in the forest, ideally these would have been slightly longer, but lack of features prevented this, some times you just have to compromise, I don't like to, but you can't have everything that you want!

I was generally pleased with my efforts but now feel I've probably "done" Pillar to death — unless of course, we get that call for the British Relays! The onthe-day verdict has to come from the competitors, I think most were happy — I know I would have been! $$\rm I8$$
