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HALO Committee 2008 - 2009

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
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

How do you become a successful orienteer? Part of the answer is motivation. As with everything you do in life, you need a goal. Remember little goals turn into big goals, realistic goals turn into achievable goals, and so on.

Take two mythical orienteers - Simon, M10 and Bill, M75 are 60 years apart.



Simon is standing on the threshold of his orienteering career, wants to do that, go there, needs a t-shirt but in order to succeed he has to scale the triangle to reach the peak. Bill on the other hand, has been there, done that, and has got a drawer full of t-shirts.

How do you know when you have reached your peak? Well that depends. From a physical point of view it is between 25-35 years. So how do you keep training to reach your physical peak at that age, and stay as fit as you can on the way down? This is where motivation comes in.

When you first start, the motivation is simply to finish the course, then a harder course, and so on - that is why the colour coding system is so good. Then you look at the results and see the same people above you and around you. Next you try to pick them off by improving your technical skills and your fitness - and you do that by training. For a time you are the hunter - but it will not be long before you become the hunted.

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The next test when you have reached your peak is to make sure that you do not slide straight down the other side, that you stay up there for as long as you can. This is why you need to keep up the training for as long as you can.

There is nothing more satisfying than beating a youngster (Simon) when you are an old wrinkly (Bill) as it does your confidence the world of good. Even when you are on the down side of the triangle, you can still set goals for every new season. Your goal may be to win your class. However, the peak is whatever you decide - Club Champs or World Champs?

Everything is a circle. When you are just starting out as a 10 year old (Simon), the object is to just get around the course, physically you are OK but your technical skills need to be improved. When you are a 75 year old (Bill) the object is still to get around the course, and your technical skills should be nearly perfect after all those years, but physically you might be struggling.

Remember, motivation is the key. So plenty of hard training ready for next year, especially those people going into a new age group - and write down the name(s) of the person(s) that you want to beat.

Lincolnshire Bomber 2009-May-25/26

The Bomber had been a joint LOG / RAFO competition comprising a Relay; District and Long "O" started in 2006, Team HALO being the first relay winners. Previously held entirely in LOG territory discussion had taken place during the Poacher series about how the various woods could be joined up to create a Long "O" and how the Bomber was an appropriate vehicle to run it. In 2009 therefore HALO was invited to participate, making use of the Earl of Yarborough's Estate, and the Bomber organisation was well under way when I joined the team.

One of the problems with running a Long "O" is the high map cost (at least 2 X A3 and an A4 map with associated mapping costs), the minibus travel to a remote start, and relatively few entrants. This makes it uneconomic as a stand alone Event and only becomes feasible when linked with a District (Colour Coded) Event. This can spread some of the costs over a larger number of competitors. Items such as mapping, planning costs, toilets etc are covered by larger numbers.

Brian Slater and the guys from LOG had identified that Mausoleum Woods as opposed to Pillar would be feasible for the a District Event, and Brian as OCAD map librarian had the various Poacher maps to hand and confirmed they could be linked. The mapping was the key to the project. The Poacher maps had been drawn on OCAD to various standards, with various degrees to detail, and using many non standard symbols. Brian did a wonderful job in bringing them all to one standard. The map being sorted, the rest fell into place.

Brian again obtained permission from the Earl of Yarborough's estate and negotiated the car parking area (which was one of my main concerns) at Mausoleum. RAFO supplied the minibus, driver and Controller, and the format of the District Event was agreed.

By the time I joined the team in mid-Feb the preparation work was complete. It was agreed that although the Long "O" could be considered a separate Event as in the past, the streamlining of having one Planner/ Controller/ Organiser of Colour Coded and Long "O" courses saved time and duplication of effort. The Long "O" effectively became another course on the Colour Coded Event, and the organisation simplified. The exception to this was that there was a Start, four road crossings and two drinks stations outside the assembly area to consider. Paddy agreed to organise the outside assembly area elements making the organisation as a whole much more manageable. Thank you Paddy.

Pre-entries by Liam Harrington through Fabian also meant that a significant number of Colour Code entrants did not need to register on the day, relieving the pressure on registration. To counteract that however was the need to open Long "O" Registration an hour earlier than usual at 9.00am. I decided to split that away into the old HALO shelter tent. This gave the registration and computers an opportunity to set up without any disruption from early arrivals.

Thanks LOG for equipment loan, and to all those who helped make the day so successful

Planners/mappers notes:- by Brian Slater

Bringing together all the maps of the Yarborough estate did present difficulties, not least that of the duplication of symbols which I had to reduce manually as the survey proceeded. All areas of the estate were opened by Pete Kullich ably supported by son Martin (OCAD Cartography). They did this over a period of years time and permissions allowing. There is a permissive walk through the woods from April to August and Dave Offler and I ran it several times in training, so we knew its potential. Steve Bones was the instigator of the idea of the Long O' through The Estate.

There are still some unused areas of woodland to be tapped so watch this space. I am already planning a route in the opposite direction using those. We did not use Swallow Wold Wood nor did we use parts of Hendale which were mapped recently for 'The Poacher Series'.

I limited the course to 30 controls so that all would be recorded by SI; older 'dibbers' apparently have a capacity to hold 36 pieces of information only. This concentrated the mind on longer legs rather than shorter legs with direction changes. The runnable blocks lent themselves to long compass legs or use of parallel running to field boundaries, and the odd right-angle short legs place the competitor for the next longer route choice leg. I chose to start with 2 loops in Pillar so that marshalling would be kept to a minimum. The use of Swallow Wold would have required extra controls to steer around the corridor shaped wood.


The crossing at the A18 was an unfounded worry and was well managed by the team, keeping all safe negotiating a very fast road with a precarious blind bend. It didn't occur to me 'til later, but, having to circumscribe The Mausoleum on the hill after 17k of running did happen to be a most appropriate setting for those 'dying legs'. We had a great field from around the North of England including some stalwarts in their 60s. I hope I will be joining you next time!

Pete Hornsby stopped me at the BMDC saying how good it had been to run and navigate through woodland without having to use paths. He obviously thoroughly enjoyed the day as did many others. It is so very rewarding to receive such comments from old friends.

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Mike Edwards who controlled was very supportive, rigorous and giving of good advice. On the weekend of the event I was impressed with his team who checked all the sites and that all 'boxes' were working on the morning.



Mike stopped off in Lincolnshire on his way to the JK so that he could check controls and safety issues. We were able to work closely together through e-mail to achieve fair, accurate and interesting courses. Please see the many various route choices made on all of the technical courses, in Route Gadget on the HALO web-site (and linked from the Bomber Weekend Web-site).

I made a flippant prediction re the winning time for the Long O' of 90 minutes, thinking no one would near to that only to be proved wrong. Similarly fast times were recorded on the other courses. Well done to you all and thanks for coming to Lincolnshire.

HALO Lincolnshire Poacher Trophy 2009

Reports by Pete Kullich

1) 15th April : Cottagers Dale: - The 12th annual Lincolnshire Poacher Trophy Series got off to a record start with 77 competitors testing out their current state of fitness and navigation skills. Recent dry weather and a colder winter produced a fast forest with little vegetation to bother runners. Zac Field from Beverley was first home on the short course but was only 11 seconds clear of the fast running Charlotte Ward from South Cave. Four of the next seven places were occupied by juniors from Caistor Grammar School with Keelby's Sam Offler leading the way from Grasby's Jay Robinson. Long course competitors ventured into the nearby wood of Hendale and sampled newly runnable area that provided interesting route choice. LOG member Paul Murgatroyd scored maximum points ahead of Poacher webmaster Martin Kullich and mountain marathon man Andy Higgins with DVO's junior Ben Beresford in a great fourth place in front of some experienced orienteers.

2) 22nd April : Elsham: - Poacher 2009 was again blessed with superb weather and a 70+ turnout. Planner Malcom Humphrey made the best possible use of the woodland each side of the M180 motorway, an area of Elsham not used for Poacher since the late 1990's. The terrain varied from heavy going in parts to excellent runability in the far southwest of the area which was visited by Long Course competitors. Zac Field again dominated the short course with a clear win from Sam Offler and Kirmington's Digby Sowerby. Former Poacher trophy winner Dean Field made it a family double with a win on the Long Course. Behind him in sixth place with an excellent run was junior Ben Beresford who like Zac Field figures prominantly on the national scene. With only a month's experience of orienteering junior Matty Edwards showed real promise by finishing in the top ten.

3) 29th April : Willingham - was not originally in the plans for Poacher 2009 but after permission was declined for Laughton and then Broughton it became third choice. However, it turned out to be far better than expected partly due to this earlier date before the vegetation reared up but mainly due to the expert planning of courses by Neil Harvatt. The short course went into areas not recently visited and the long had plenty of controls on Hamilton Hill - the slope visited twice, and a largely runnable area to the east where competitors were confronted by a butterfly shaped section albeit one winged. A convincing win by Lincoln's Paul Murgatroyd has propelled him into the lead for the Long Course Trophy. A fantastic performance from junior Ben Beresford earned him second place - by far his best ever in the Poacher - watch this space! Almost breaking into the top ten was the only lady on the long course, Pocklington's Helena Crutchley ahead of some seasoned orienteers. The Field brothers clinched 1st and 2nd on the Short with Market Rasen's Jack Robinson

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improving in 3rd. Excellent performances came from two junior girls Jessica Beresford and Jasmine Field both in the top eight.

4) 6th May : Nettleton Woods: - A fine evening in Nettleton Woods saw another seventy plus turnout. The assembly area at the western end of the forest provided excellent parking in pleasant surroundings but this venue was not easy for planner Vernon Davis. Permission to use a significant piece of woodland near the Guide Camp was withdrawn. Vernon overcame this brilliantly to produce courses that were not only physically challenging at this time of the year but made competitors carefully consider their route choices. Top positions on the Long and Short were almost identical to last week, although the Long was more closely contested with little more than a minute separating the top three. Paul Murgatroyd's odds have shortened for the Lincolnshire Poacher Trophy after another maximum. On the Short Course the Field family figure in all three groups. Zac has what looks to be an unassailable lead whilst younger brother Jake contends with Sam Offler for the junior cup. Mother Rosie Field again looks the favourite for the Ladies Trophy.

5) 13th May : Middle Rasen: - Course planner Paul Murgatroyd had a very difficult task here. Large areas of new trees, cattle enclosures and challenging vegetation severely restricted his choice of control sites. However, he rose to the task and included a butterfly section of controls for Long competitors in a runnable part of the wood to the North. The lack of rain in the last two months had dried up some of the marshes and ponds, one of which proved to be particularly elusive for some. Results on Short and Long courses were altered to compensate for a problem with two controls, a rare occurrence considering the Poacher Series' frugal approach to man power. There was a double win for the Fields on the time adjusted courses.

6) 20th May : Primrose Warren : - Making his debut as planner Brigg's Pete Shew did an excellent job. Although the wood has probably been used by HALO more times than any other, Pete's courses visiting new control sites gave everyone a good navigational challenge with some close competition. None more so than on the Long course where Poacher Trophy main contender Paul Murgatroyd was pushed all the way by 2008 Master's Champion Neil Harvatt who is two age groups higher. Only sixteen seconds separated them with both using their new high speed dibbers. Has anyone calculated the advantage over fifteen or so controls? A notable performance came from W45 Helena who vanquished several regular male Poachers. Zac Field continued his excellent form with a clear win on the Short.

7) 27th May : Otby : - After a two year absence The Poacher returned to Otby - the only orienteering area in Lincolnshire with significant hills. The weather was dry, which in one way was a pity as planner Brian Slater provided waterproof maps for competitors, a first for Poacher but for the meantime probably a one-off.

Brian made excellent use of the area which is used with the kind permission of three local farmers. The car parking area, including toilets, is much appreciated. All courses had plenty of climb with veteran mid Lincolnshire orienteer Geoff Holmes likening the Short course leg from control nine to ten with the North face of the Eiger. Long course competitors debated the optimum route to number eight - low or high - the jury is still out. After another win, Zac Field is now one Wednesday evening away from a potential eight maximum scores on the Short course. Behind, Jack Robinson had his best run of the season so far finishing in second place, as did Grasby's Gary Robinson who finished well clear of son Jay. Lincoln's Paul Murgatrovd outran the opposition on the Long course ahead of Master Champion Neil Harvatt and Norwegian visitor Helge Stenerud.

8) 3rd June : Normanby Park : - lived up to its reputation as the most difficult Poacher area. The myriad of small paths coupled with lively

vegetation disguising knolls and depressions did their best to confuse the most experienced orienteers. Planner Pete Harris produced technical courses that required the utmost concentration. Control sites were visited more than once but each time from a different direction. Plaudits must be awarded to the many competitors who successfully completed their course despite taking a considerable amount of time. Their determination is to be admired. Reigning junior champion Jake Field returned to form with a win on the Short course ahead of fellow junior Jack Robinson. HALO chairman John Butler, despite being held back by a long term knee problem, revelled in the technical difficulty of the area with a great third

place. The Long Course saw its closest finish in Poacher history with Poacher web master Martin Kullich holding off Normanby Park expert Neil Harvatt by a mere 1 second.

9) 10th June : Foxdale : - Debutant Michael Robinson must be congratulated for producing challenging courses. He gave runners plenty of route choice and on the Long course several crossings of the dry valley of Foxdale. The Long course was dominated by Paul Murgatroyd from

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Sudbrooke, a clear winner from the RAF's Philip Johnstone-Davis. The strong running Dave Jolly from Glentham was delighted with his fourth place, by far and away his best Poacher performance. The Short Course trophy has been retained yet again by Zac Field with a maximum points haul.

10) 17th June : Brompton Dale : - to the South and Haliday Hill to the North of car parking provided excellent runnability, the best of the Poacher Series. The Long course provided another maximum fifty points for newly crowned Lincolnshire Poacher Champion Paul Murgatroyd. However, he was pushed all the way by Beverley's Dean Field who was only twenty six seconds adrift. In third was Neil Harvatt who is in a close battle with Dean for the Masters Trophy. Also enjoying the evening was last weeks planner Michael Robinson in an excellent fifth place and

Selby's Steve Willis who returned to form with a top ten finish. There was a first ever win on the Short course for Jack Robinson in a closely contested race ahead of five other juniors.

11) 24th June : **Swallow Wold Wood** : - Poacher 2009 came to a successful end at Swallow Wold Wood, yet another runnable area of The Earl Of Yarborough's estate. Dean Field planning his first Poacher event produced admirable courses utilising the best bits of the wood to test competitor's navigational prowess. Course lengths were a bit longer than usual in order to overcome the large area of farmland in

the middle of the wood. With eight of the eleven races to count this year, two trophies had still to be resolved on the night. As Dean was planning the courses and unable to add to his points score it was up to close rival Neil Harvatt to finish at least third. This he did finishing second in a tight finish behind winner Martin Kullich to clinch the Masters title. The junior title race was almost as close with Sam Offler in fifth place clinching the trophy on the night. The 2009 series saw a significant increase in participation over and above the record breaking 2008 with many competitors coming from the immediate area, emphasising the importance of local orienteering. The weather was another plus with virtually every Wednesday dry, not the case in the past. Poacher moved up yet another notch with the use of waterproof maps and even lists of split times in the pub afterwards. All these innovations courtesy of Brian Slater, who once again did a sterling job on registration and RouteGadget.

Thanks to everyone who has helped in way with Poacher 2009 - kite retrievers, registration, dibber hire, planners, results, etc. and particularly all the competitors for turning up. See you on April 14th 2010.

This edition has featured the Poacher series. For many members this is the only involvement with HALO Orienteering. I would encourage those relatively new to the sport to try other club's events Those new members to the south of the HALO area might try out the last LOG summer series events. I know they will get a warm welcome and assistance will be available if they are unsure about the procedures. Our thanks again to Pete Kullich for masterminding the series.

The Scottish 6 days is imminent and the M60 challenge is there again. Will Paddy reign supreme again in both the forest and as Masterchef?

Elsewhere there are one or two other options for those preparing to travel a little further.

The number of traditional colour coded cross country races / district events does seem to be declining or perhaps I still cannot fathom out the new terminology. Perhaps they have been pushed into a void by the new orienteering structure. The AIRE fixture list now shows a mixture of Regional, Informal and Night Score events. The only recognisable District event being in June 2010. An alternative thought is that the District Events do not generate the income for the effort involved. The returns from our Colour Coded Events at Primrose and the Bomber are very meagre compared with the Regional Event at Londesborough. The way forward then appears to be to hold Colour Coded Events with a few more courses to upgrade them to Regional status, have an external controller and double the entry fee. One consequence of this would be that Regional Events could be held at Primrose - who would have thought it! Perhaps the committee will be considering this in the future.
